SCOUTING IN THE PHILIPPINES

Girl Scouts at Panglao Island

Editor's Note: This is a short report of some amazing work being done by Rotary and Scouting in the Philippines with extraordinary support from Australia. Exemplary work like this should be an inspiration to us all over the world.

Since 2005 we have conducted a Rotary sponsored Camp-O-Rama for Panglao Island, including all schools in Panglao Town and Dauis Town. The 2005 camp had 27 Boy Scout Troops and 27 Girl Scout troops representing All Public Schools on the Island with a total attendance of 3,200 Scouts.

The latest Camp-O- Rama only sponsored Panglao Town, because of the dramatic growth in the number of families now living on Panglao Island. We had 12 Boy Scout troops from 12 public schools and an equal number of Girl Scout troops in attendance. We were blessed with good weather and a nice sea breeze. Much to our delight, when we counted the number of scouts who registered for the Camp-O-Rama we had an astounding 3201 Scouts.

Most families on Panglao Island are fishermen or farmers. Because Rotary sponsored the camping, there was no registration fee. We have never had a fee, because it would deter the poorest of Gods children from attending. We rely on donations from Rotary clubs and local businesses for the small overhead, which is about ONE AUS-TRALIAN DOLLAR per scout. Our Camp-O-Rama attracts more attendees than the big Bohol Wide Camp experience sponsored by the Boy Scout Council and separately by the Girl Scout Council. Respectfully, the fact that our camping is confined to Panglao Island, only 12 km long and 6 km wide, means that everyone can get on a bus and be to the camp grounds in 20 minutes. Naturally we have the full cooperation of the Boy Scout, Girl Scout Council, the Mayor of Panglao Town and the Department of Education and many others too. As the camp was demobilized we heard the scouts say, (WHEN CAN WE GO CAMPING AGAIN?!)

Barnard Castle Rotary Club (UK). December 20, 2015 The Barnard Castle Rotary Club included the Staindrop Scouts and Barnard Castle Scouts as major recipients in their charitable efforts.

<u>Bewdley Rotary Club (UK).</u> November 17, 2015 The Bewdley Rotary Club made donations to the Bewdley Guides and Brownies and other community organizations from the proceeds of their recent Button Oak Community Fete.

<u>Buchanan Rotary Club (VA).</u> November 18, 2015 The Buchanan Rotary Club, Boy Scout Troop 131 and Cub Scout Pack 207 celebrated the completion of renovations to the Buchanan Scout Lodge building. The Buchanan Rotary Club has sponsored Troop 131 since the early 1940s and now sponsors Pack 207. The Rotary Club originally built the Scout Lodge in the mid 1970s.

IN MEMORIAM

Tom A. Bayless

November 30, 1926 - October 25, 2014 Tom is survived by his loving wife of 63 years, Frances Baker Bayless. Tom graduated with a Master's degree from the University of Michigan, where he was a member of the Sigma Chi fraternity and manager of the varsity hockey team. He served with honor in the U.S. Army during World War II. Following the war, he had a long and successful career with Standard Oil of Ohio.

Tom was active in scouting throughout his life, joining the Boy Scouts at a young age and earning the rank of Eagle Scout. As an adult he was a Scoutmaster, a founder of the Eagle Scout Association of Cleveland, and the creator of the Golden Book of Eagles which honors each new Eagle Scout in the Greater Cleveland Council. He was also awarded the Silver Beaver.

Tom was an active and devoted Rotarian, being honored as Rotarian of the Year in 2005 (Rotary Club of Cleveland). Tom received many service honors and awards during his adult life. Of special significance to him was his induction into the Shaker Heights Alumni Association Hall of fame in 2002, and his receipt of the Cliff Dochterman Award of the International Fellowship of Scouting Rotarians in 2008. He served as Honorary President of the Rotary Club of Cleveland from 2010-2011. Tom will be missed.


B-P Bits:



For a man who was a product of an age that wasn't shy about shooting animals for sport alone, B-P was remarkably far-sighted in his attitudes. Scouting likes to look at the original Scout as a proto-environmentalist whose life was about getting close to nature and understanding its importance.

1908 Handbook: "A Scout is a friend to animals. He should not kill any animal unnecessarily, even if it is only a fly." "I have said the hunting or going after big game is one of the best things in Scouting. I did not say shooting or killing the game was the best part; for as you get to study animals you get to like them more and more, and you will soon find that you don't want to kill them for the mere sake of killing."

In early November 2015, the Government of Sierra Leone announced the official end of the Ebola outbreak which had gripped the country for over 18 months. The Scouts of Sierra Leone played a key role in this victory. Supported by UNICEF, the Scouts of Sierra Leone undertook social mobilization including walking on the streets, carrying posters with information on the symptoms of Ebola and best practices to help prevent its spread, across the country. They also went door-to-door to reach every home, community and village with safety messages and to have a face-to-face engagement.

In August 1912, Ramón Ocando Pérez, 13 years old, went on holiday to Curacao and met some scouts. Returning to Maracaibo, he formed the "Club Boy Scouts of Maracaibo" in 1913 with some friends.

The first actual Scout Troop in Venezuela was the "San Sebastian No. 1", with five patrols called by the foundation, Wolves, Foxes, Ocelots, Curlews and Coquivacoas. Scout Troop 42 was formed on the 20 January 1913, the day of St. Sebastian, patron of the city of Maracaibo, and adopted the green color in the scarf, symbolizing hope and nature.


All sections are coeducational. Association members use wine-red neckerchiefs when attending international events. The national emblem of the Asociación de Scouts de Venezuela and the motto state the identity and values of Venezuelan Scouting: High Ideals, Elevation of Sights, Justice, Loyalty and Perseverance.

Sections: Lobatos-Lobeznas/Cubs- 7 to 11, Scouts 11 to 16, Rovers 16-21

Scout Promise:

On my honor, and with the grace of God I force myself to serve as the best you can my church, my country, to help my neighbor in all circumstances and to fulfill the Law Scout

Patrol Promise: I promise to obey you as Chief, love you like a big brother, be loyal to my Patrol and never be discouraged.
