NEW IFSR OUTSTANDING ACHIEVEMENT CERTIFICATE

For Rotary Clubs to Recognize Outstanding Achievement

The IFSR has preprinted certificates for presentation to Scouts and Girl Guides in the USA and Canada when they achieve one of the pinnacles of Scouting. However, we don't have certificates for the Summit Award in the BSA's Venturing Program, the Spurgeon Award in Exploring, and the equivalent of Eagle Scout Award in other Scout and Guide Associations. The IFSR encourages Scouts and Girl Guides be recognized for outstanding achievement even when there isn't a preprinted IFSR certificate. For those situations, the IFSR has introduced the IFSR Outstanding Achievement Certificate which may be presented by any Rotary Club to a Scout or Girl Guide who has demonstrated outstanding achievement. The certificate may be given to any Scout or Girl Guide who has attained one of the pinnacles of Scouting.



To help Rotary Clubs create and print the certificate locally, this website has a fillable PDF version of the certificate which is easy to fill out:

- 1) Open the form http://www.scouters.us/ifsr/downloads/OutstandingAchievementCertificate.pdf
- 2) Enter the name of the Scout or Girl Guide
- 3) Enter the name of the Rotary Club (such as Metropolis Rotary Club)
- 4) Enter the date of the certificate presentation
- 5) Then print the certificate or save and print at a print center.

IN MEMORIUM



Norlyn L. "Bud" Allison, 1926-2018

Norlyn "Bud" Allison, 91, of League City, Texas, passed peacefully Sunday, Sept. 9, surrounded by his loving family.

Born Oct. 22, 1926, in Oklahoma City, Okla., to William "Bill" and Dossie (Harris) Allison, he lived his youth in Ottawa.

He graduated from Colorado A&M in 1950 with a degree in zoology. There he met his future wife, Jeanne Marie Furst, and they married on May 6, 1950. He completed a master's degree in leadership development from Texas A&M.

He served in World War II as a part of the Army Air Corps.

In 1938, he joined Boy Scout Troop 38 in Tulsa, Okla. At the age of 12 and served the organization for 80 years, including as a member of a troop in Illinois, and later as a career Scouting professional. In 2010 the Boy Scouts of America celebrated its 100th anniversary. Norlyn "Bud" Allison was quoted as saying he had been married for 60 years and credited his long-lasting marriage partly to the values he learned as a Boy Scout, such as loyalty. "The uniforms have changed, but the ideals have not changed," said Allison. "The scout oath and law are still as important today as they were 100 years ago when Baden-Powell and Mr. Boyce put the program together.

His becoming a Boy Scout began the journey that would also become his professional career. He received many awards including Eagle Scout, Order of the Arrow, Wood Badge, Silver Beaver and Silver Antelope, all exemplifying his dedication and service to others. He retired from Sam Houston Area Council in 1987 and continued to serve there as a volunteer.

Bud and Jeanne shared a mutual love of travel, visiting over 30 countries. In addition, Bud was active in the International Fellowship of Scouting Rotarians where he served as World President in 2008-2009. In 2010, Rotary International District 5890, Greater Houston Area, recognized Bud, a member of the Braes Bayou Rotary Club, with the award for "A Lifetime of Excellence in Service to Humanity Through Scouting & Rotary."

For 37 years, Bud was also very active in Christmas International House which was created to host international students during holiday breaks when other students went home. They were avid hosts of foreign students creating a welcoming home for those from afar, many of whom became lifelong friends.



Bud was also active in Hands Across the Border with Mexico. He recently achieved a long-held dream of returning to England, traveling with his daughters and visiting several old friends and Gilwell Scout Park. He was an active member of Webster Presbyterian Church, Webster, Texas.

Bud was preceded in death by his wife, Jeanne; an infant son, Randy; brother, Delburt; and sister, Leola. He is survived by his children, Greg Allison (Glynda), Karen Jenkins (James) and Janet Allison; seven grandchildren; and six great-grandchildren.

Mr. Scott, RVM, OBE, a former police assistant commissioner who was heavily involved in the community, died on Wednesday a month short of his 77th birthday. Ac cording to family, he spent a lifetime living that philosophy by serving others.

"My dad was a very humble and very modest man. He would give you the shirt off his back or the last dollar in his wallet," Mr. Scott's daughter, Vivienne Scott, told the Rotorua Daily Post.

"He spent a lifetime serving, not for any reason other than he loved people, he was in his element surrounded by others and all were treated equally. "It didn't matter whether the person was the local service station attendant, the Queen of England or anyone in between - everyone was treated with re-

Rotarians have found many ways to serve Scout and Guide units, and they can receive the IFSR Youth Service Award for serving a Scout or Guide unit and having it mentioned in the media, any media outlet.

The IFSR Youth Service Award may be awarded to any Rotary Club that renders service in support of Scout and/or Guide units which is publicized in the media, any media. The IFSR Webmaster may give the awards to a club annually. Recipients are selected from articles posted in media or online. Such articles may be brought to the attention of the IFSR webmaster [webmaster@scouters.us].

This is not a Scouting award nor a Rotary award, but an IFSR award and is intended to reward Rotary Clubs who support local Scout and/or Guide Units and have their support publicized in the media or online.

To ensure that the award is available worldwide in a timely manner, it is only distributed electronically. The recipient club will be notified of the award and given instructions on how to download and print the certificate. The award can be downloaded and printed by the club themselves or at a print center.

It is hoped that the example provided by the clubs earning these awards will serve as an example on how Rotary Clubs can become more involved in service to youth and in particular to Scout and Guide units. Hopefully these Rotarians will become more aware of the IFSR and the services it provides to Rotarians in their support of Scout and Guide units. Original Brownsea Scout Arthur Primmer's memories: "The first day activities proved to be "patrolling". B-P wanted to find out if the patrol method he had devised would work. Our Patrol Leaders learned how to move their patrols about by hand motions and we learned how to follow their silent signals. We practiced how to proceed soundlessly through the landscape, how to spread out our line and how to reassemble, how to walk slowly and how to run at Scout's pace. Tracking and stalking were two of the skills we acquired. Each patrol staged a track story in the soft dirt for the rest of us to decipher. One day, the chief officer of the local coast guard arrived and supervised practices in first aid, lifesaving, and artificial respiration. The hour between dinner and campfire every evening was dedicated to fun and fitness. Sometimes we played a primitive form of basketball, using bottomless fruit baskets for goals."

Collectors' Corner: Asia-Pacific Jamborees



Initial results of study show that Scouting improves young people's adaptability:

Korea Scout Association has been conducting a study since 2013 on what Scouting would mean for the youth, how Scouting improves a person's potential abilities, and how Scouting activities are effective as a whole. Dr. Eugene Eun-Gui Kim, International Commissioner of the Korea Scout Association, said that the research has shown that Scouts are more capable than the average teenager. "The results of the research have shown us that a young person who has been in Scouting for a long time shows higher levels of change in capabilities and optimism than those young people who are not." The longer the time that a young person spends in Scouting or in its activities, the greater the opportunity for learning about their ability to adapt and improve their interpersonal relationships and organizational ability, and eventually, overcome individualism among teenagers," he stressed further.

The Scout and Guide Association of Qatar was founded in 1956 and became a member of the World Organization of the Scout Movement in 1965; the organization is also a member of the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts. It serves 4,208 Scouts (as of 2011) and 1,916 Guides (as of 2003). The Scout president facilitated the building of the local zoo. Program emphasis is on out-of-school education in religion, citizenship and health as well as the usual Scoutcrafts, physical fitness and community service. There are Scout courses in wildlife conservation and projects for increasing plant life. Guiding was started in 1995, as the present government issued a decree and accepted the formation of the Guiding movement. Immediately, the Guides joined the Scouts and The Scout and Guide Association of Qatar was established. The Minister of Education has recruited six Commissioners to promote Guiding as an extracurricular activity in all schools. All leaders are teachers in the schools. Guiding is rapidly gaining a high profile in society, reflected in their membership. Members come from different areas and various sections of society. Guiding mostly operates from Doha, however some units have started in different parts of the country. There is a special program for Sea Scouts who are trained in all water and boat activities. There is also a small Air Scout section. The Scout Motto is Kun Musta'idan. The noun for a single Scout is Kashaf. The membership badge incorporates elements of the coat of arms of Qatar, and both the trefoil representing the girls and the fleur-delis representing the boys.

International Scouting events inspire young people across the world to carry on Scouting: For young people, especially older Scouts, international Scouting experiences are an opportunity to re-connect with Scouting and go beyond the weekly meetings in the local community that are the bread and butter of the Scouting experience throughout the world. At international events, young people get to see how other countries practice Scouting, find inspiration for activities and make new friends.



At Roverway this year, the biggest contingents were from Europe, but young people flew in from as far afield as Saudi Arabia, Taiwan, Lebanon and Ghana. After camping together on the beach at The Hague, the more than 4,500 participants split up into their different programs, known as paths, which had been organized in towns and rural areas throughout the country, before gathering for the final five-day camp about an hour's drive east of Amsterdam. On the opening night, Frans Timmermans, a former Foreign Minister of The Netherlands and an EU Commissioner, took to the stage to address the thousands of young people gathered on the sand. A Scout as a child, Timmermans spoke of the need for cultural understanding, curiosity about the world and a determination to make things better. A highlight of Roverway was the international dinner that took place one evening, with groups of Scouts from each country cooking their favourite dishes.
